



3. Andrea Furlan publishes paper in JAMA on opioid use

We noted that Andrea Furlan was a co-author on a randomized clinical trial in chronic pain patients, comparing usual care, to three day-long sessions that emphasized skill-based education which was supplemented by one-on-one support for the following year. They demonstrated a marked reduction in use of opioids, although there was no effect on perceived pain interference with daily activities.
